Behind the ivy-covered facade of a former Brooklyn shoe factory built in 1897, Batteau has built a life around the things she values. She is the creative director of Callidus Guild, which produces some of the world's most beautiful handmade wallpapers. With a coterie of painters, sculptors, gilders, and plasterers, she has formed a collective of like-minded makers, "I have a vision of it being like a Florentine guild," she says. Batteau has come a long way from the
